Love and War— The Beginning of Valentine's Day

As February draws near many of us will be making plans for celebrating Valentine's Day. Flowers or candy will be purchased. Children will fill out Valentine's cards for classmates at school. Couples may plan a night out together. We do such things to celebrate romantic love.

Valentine's Day actually has its roots in war. When Claudius II was emperor of Rome, the Roman Empire was engaged in several bloody wars. Casualties were high, and the empire had trouble finding men to serve as soldiers. Claudius reasoned that this was due to married men not wanting to leave their brides and children to fight, so he cancelled all marriages and made it illegal to get married.

Valentine was a priest in Rome at this time, and he decided to defy the emperor, performing marriages in secret. His actions got him arrested and killed. Years later he was canonized and become a saint. Valentine took his stand in support of love, and the rest, as they say, is history.

In my own life I saw the dance between love and war. My parents married just before World War II. Before they could start a family, my father was drafted and served in the European theater of the war. Separated by distance and time, my parents wrote to each other to keep their love alive. Decades later, when my father died, my mother renewed that practice. She wrote love letters to my father as if he was away at war. Later, when she died, I found all of those love letters and was deeply touched.

When love is strong, it bridges the divides between us. When the circumstances of life seek to separate us from each other, as individuals or groups, love has the power to

bring us together. It was like that for my parents, both in war and in death. It is like that for all who follow Jesus.

In many ways our relationship to Christ is like that of separated lovers. Jesus comes to the world to reveal God's love, then he leaves us to return to God. Having been touched by God's love in this way, we await the return of Christ when God's love will be fully revealed to all creation. In the meantime, we write our love letters to God, doing our best to keep the love alive.

We write such letters in many ways. Worship is one way that we write our love letters. We praise God with music and song. We thank God with prayers and offerings. We seek God's guidance so that the life we live between worship services becomes another kind of love letter. Every good deed we do; every sacrifice we make for others; every ministry or program that touches human need; every time we welcome strangers; every time we stand for justice; every time we treat others with love and respect; all such acts, whether done by one or many persons, are love letters to God. They keep the love of Christ alive in human hearts and

minds. They transform the world and bring the kingdom near, paving the way for Christ's return.

I am convinced that we need to send more love letters to God these days. The past election season was the meanest and most divisive that I have ever seen. Politicians played on fears and hatred in order to gain a political advantage. Candidates demonized each other. There were fights at rallies. Tensions rose, not only in our country, but around the world. History is full of such sad chapters times when the dark side of humanity seems to triumph over our better nature. In such previous times, it has often been people of faith who have stemmed the tides of anger, hatred, and injustice and brought about more positive transformations. It was like that long ago when Valentine defied an emperor. It needs to be that way again! Those of us who love God, who claim the name of Christ, need to write new love letters to God. Only that kind of living and loving can help us close one sad chapter of human history and begin writing another glad chapter when love triumphs and life is transformed.
