Crucifixion & Resurrection: A Gift of Love...

Last month, we celebrated Easter and gave thanks for the great gift of love proclaimed from the empty tomb. Now, as May dawns upon us, we await Pentecost—the day when the ministry of Jesus was handed over to the disciples, and the Church was born. In this month of renewal, as we watch the natural world awaken from winter and blossom into summer, we, Christians, also experience a season of renewal as we prepare to carry on all that Jesus started.

As this season of change and renewal dawns upon us, it might be good for us to reflect for a moment on what our Lord's death and resurrection are all about. They are, after all, the foundation on which the Church is built.

The world into which Jesus came was a harsh and judgmental one. Jewish laws were guilt-oriented. When a law was broken, one had to go to the temple and make the proper sacrifice to "erase" the sin and restore one's standing with God. There were so many such laws that one could not make it through the day without breaking at least one of them. This of course, led to a wonderful system at the temple. Persons seldom had a dove or the proper grain offering with them when they needed to atone for their law-breaking deed, so these were always available at the temple, where for a *small price* individuals could purchase the required animal or grain, and then make their sacrifice. Selling such things made some folks very wealthy. It was capitalism at its finest!

Jesus came to confront this flawed system with the power of God's grace and love. He drove the money-changers and merchants from the temple. He confronted the

Old Business:

- Telephone and Internet was looked into by Connie, Verizon was priced at \$20 for the phone line and about \$55 for 5 GB of data with a total of about \$75 per month vs the \$200 we are currently paying. We are still looking into the elevator phone line, which Verizon can't do because it needs to be an uninterrupted line.
- License for the copyright on music is \$124.00 per year. We will be signing a contract.

New Business:

- Elevator contract went up 5% for the maintenance plan as of May 1, 2017. There is a maintenance scheduled for March.
- We have the eggs, ham, and sausage for Easter Breakfast, but we still need butter, milk, and juice.
- We will be starting a list of ideas for Memorial Funds for families to utilize.

- Aron will check on the storage unit we have in Shiocton and clean out the shed to make room, so we can discontinue the use of the storage unit.
- The dumpster is in need of repair. We will check with Grant Krull, as he is a license welder. We may give the town a key to the dumpster for when they come to empty it, so we don't have to have it unlocked prior.
- LED Lighting is more economical than fluorescent lighting in terms of energy use. We may want to get estimates for converting our fluorescent lighting to LED, so that we can determine if such a conversion is cost effective for our situation.
- We will be looking into creating a New Member Committee.
- We will have a wedding in May 2018 (Gregg Holz).
- Summer Worship hours will start on Sunday, May 28, 2017, at 9:00 a.m.
- Randy Miller is pursuing Lay Ministry as a vocation, in our Association, and to do so he must submit himself for psychological evaluation to determine his mental fitness for such ministry. The cost is \$1,200.00, with the cost being divided between the Association, the congregation, and the applicant. We voted and approved to pay for the congregation and applicant portions for a total of \$800.00.

A motion was made, by Aron Rasmussen and seconded by Gary Vander Linden, to adjourn the meeting. Motion passed.

Next Council Meeting will be Tuesday, April 11, 2017, at 6:30 p.m.

The meeting ended with the Lord's Prayer.

Pharisees, scribes, and temple officials with their inhumane and grace-less ways, and declared that God's Kingdom was based on grace, not on law. God's rule was not about measuring up or making amends. It was about celebrating love and living from grace.

What Jesus had to say presented challenges to those in power, so they killed Him. God defeated their power by raising Jesus from the grave—revealing that Divine Love can never be killed. So in the crucifixion and resurrection, we experience the most wonderful gift of love ever seen. John proclaims the gift in his gospel: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him may not perish, but may have eternal life" (John 3:16 NRSV). The events of Holy Week point us to our purpose as followers of Jesus. We proclaim the power of love and gracefully share it with the world—at least that is what is supposed to happen!

Sadly, we, human beings, have trouble shedding our penchant for guilt. Guilt is a wonderful tool. When you can make someone feel guilty, you have power over him or her. The Pharisees and the scribes knew that, and they used the power of guilt to control the Jewish people. In today's world, we often mimic their behavior. We opt for guilt instead of grace. We seek to control others with their feelings of inadequacy. We tend to make people feel "less than" instead of "more than" as we communicate the message of the gospel. How often have we passed those billboards that declare that Jesus died for the sins of the world? How many times have preachers railed at their congregations saying, "Jesus Christ died for you, you miserable sinner"? Sadly,

much more often than is helpful, or truthful. Jesus was **not** a sin offering. **He was a love offering!** God did not send Jesus to be a sacrifice for our sins, but to be a gift of love that would restore us in mind and spirit, so that we might better serve God's purpose of love and reconciliation.

Yes, we humans are so often a sinful bunch. We let greed and power distort our thinking. Surely, we are all in need of grace. That, however, does not make Jesus a sacrifice to sin. Rather, Jesus gives Himself out of love. He clearly stated this to His disciples when He said, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13 NRSV). Jesus does not rail at the disciples declaring that He has to die because of their sin. Rather, he tenderly encourages them to love the way He loves and to see His life as the greatest gift of love. Jesus urges them to do the same—to love with reckless abandon.

Sometimes, I think that we, Christians, have trouble giving up the "guilt card". We play that card too much, using guilt as a weapon of intimidation. Is it any wonder that many persons, who believe in God and in Jesus, choose not to come to church?

I think it is time for us to reclaim the rightful foundation of all that we do. We do not build on guilt, but on grace. We were not called by Christ to stand in judgment of others, but to love others and restore their value as blessed children of God.

As we prepare for the birthday of the Church on Pentecost, we would do well to re-claim our rightful role as followers of Jesus. We are dispensers of love and grace—nothing more, and nothing less.



Good Shepherd Annual Meeting

The 38th annual membership meeting for Good Shepherd Service LTD was held on Tuesday, April 25, 2017.

Doreen Kluth, president, was in charge of the meeting. She announced the 2017-2018 officers for the Good Shepherd Board of Directors.

Jane Jerzak gave a presentation of the 2016 Good Shepherd Services annual financial audit results.

Good Shepherd staff served 162 individuals in 2016. There are 50 rooms in the home, with 40 currently occupied. Good Shepherd reports a \$700/day loss per resident in the nursing home. Forty percent of the people in the nursing home are in rehabilitation, with sixty percent of those live in the nursing home, and the remaining forty percent of rehabilitation clients reside outside the facility. There are thirty-six units in Meadow Wood Residential Care Apartments. These are occupied by private pay clients. The twenty-six units in Shepherd's Inn CBRF are private pay and Medicaid paid units. Thirteen units in Birch Way CBRF are also private and Medicaid paid, as well as the nineteen units in Forest Glen CBRF.

In total, Good Shepherd reports a loss of \$313,000.00, in 2016, from the nursing home and childcare services. Rehabilitation services broke even, and Meadow Wood yielded a profit of \$118,000.00 in 2016. Netting a loss of \$128,000.00, but with contributions and investments, Good Shepherd balanced the budget, which is better than they did the two previous years.
