Make a Joyful Noise . . .

Sixty years ago, in August of 1957, the Fritz family was on its way to northern Minnesota for a week of vacation. Along the way, we passed through a small town and noticed a sign: Church of Christ, two blocks. It was Sunday morning, and upon seeing the sign, my mother said, "That's what we are now.", so we decided to stop for worship. It was an eyeopening decision.

In June of that summer, the United Church of Christ had come into being, and our Evangelical and Reformed church had become UCC. Mom thought we were stopping to worship in a United Church of Christ, but it was a Church of Christ—a totally different animal. The Church of Christ is very fundamentalistic and does not allow instrumental music in worship. Such things are thought to be instruments of the devil. We were too polite to walk out in the middle of the service. All of the Fritzes wanted to run for the door, but we waited for worship to end before making our hasty exit. At first, we wondered what we had gotten ourselves into with the United Church of Christ. Later, we learned that the UCC was different from the Church of Christ—and we rejoiced!

That little episode reminded all of us how important music was to our worship experiences. Mom played organ. My sister and I sang in the children's choir, and we all loved hearing the music of worship accented with various instruments. Later, as a college student, I introduced "Rock Worship" to my church and held services on Sunday evenings that used rock music instead of traditional church music. The youth loved it; the adults were not too enthused;

Through <u>www.ucc.org/justice</u>, the UCC's National Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues.

Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (*a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates*), the Justice and Witness Ministry continues its strong policy of advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice.

Neighbors in Need also supports American Indians in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM).

Historically, forbearers of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today, there are twenty UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation, in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These congregations and their pastors are

but, it was a joyful noise.



I have always enjoyed the music of worship, and I have come to appreciate the variety of musical styles that can be used in worship. When I attended the General Synod in Providence, Rhode Island, in 1999, I was overwhelmed with the music, which was all provided by drums. It was the most stirring joyful noise I had ever heard.

Music plays a vital role in worship. It touches that part of the human spirit that needs more than words to know God. Music also presents a challenge. Each person has her or his favorite musical genre. Some like Country, while others prefer Rock. Still others like Rap, or Jazz, or Blue Grass, or Gospel music. If we want to reach all who worship with us, we sometimes have to use and accept different musical styles. Doing so helps us reach more persons with the love of God and the joy of worship.

I have many colleagues who spend time in meditation and prayer as a means of keeping connected to God. I have never been able to cultivate that practice. It seems cumbersome and does not seem to fit who I am. I would rather sing a hymn or hum its tune to myself, or listen to music that expresses the joys and challenges of being human—even if it is not religious music. Many years ago, I heard a statement that has stuck with me ever since: **"He who sings prays twice."** I do not know who first said those words, but they sum up my point of view. I find that I am closest to God when there is a joyful noise in the air or in my heart. I pray twice a lot.
