

From Pastor Moira's Desk... Independence & Inter-dependence

It's already started ~ fireworks season: tents have appeared on corners and in parking lots, stores have rows and rows of things as simple as sparklers and as big as giant explosives, and my neighbors have been having a few test runs of their arsenal when the weather allowed (thankfully they are careful if it's overly hot and dry).

All of this leads up to the big events on (or around) July 4th celebrating Independence Day when the windows of my house will shake, and the cats and I will hide (them under the bed, and me in my chair) during the village fireworks. But I struggle with more than just fireworks on Independence Day. I get it, that we are celebrating the victory of the Revolutionary War, our freedom from England, and the beginning of our country, but the idea of independence just doesn't make sense to me.

When I was in seminary I went to breakfast with a classmate who wanted to get to know me better. After we had ordered, she started with the usual question, "tell me about yourself", so I started to tell her about where my family is from, and who my grandparents were. She stopped me and said, "I don't want to know about them, just about you." I tried again, talking about my parents, but she interrupted another time and said, "no, none of those people, just you, separate from all of them."

I am still confused by that idea, by the notion that I could possibly exist without the people who have come before me, and the ones who will come after me. We simply aren't independent beings. We were created by God, breathed into this life, to be together, made for each other, for community, for inter-dependence. If we learned anything from the pandemic, we surely learned that ~ we need each other, we depend on one another, on friends and strangers alike, more than we might possibly imagine.

I can't do my work as a pastor without others. A farmer can't do their work unless someone wants to have what they produce. A teacher can't teach unless

there are students waiting to learn. All of our lives are intricately bound up in one another. It may not always be immediately clear how, but what we do here in northern Wisconsin affects people across the state, on the other side of the country, and on the far side of the world, and what they do affects us.


Over and over Jesus taught this message about community, about connection, about our dependence on one another, and on God, but it is so easy to forget it when we are surrounded by images and stories of independence, of the strong individual who accomplishes something on their own, or pulls themselves up by their bootstraps, or You get the idea. It's a dominant message in the movies, the story of our founding, and still the way we're encouraged to be ~ independent, no need to rely on anyone for anything, strong enough to tough it out on our own, by ourselves. But that isn't how Jesus wanted his disciples, the first ones and us all these years later to live. He wanted us to know our connections, to honor and celebrate them, to remember that we need each other, that we are stronger when we have all of us, in all our glorious diversity, when everyone is working together towards the goal of God's kingdom of peace and hope.

Jesus calls us into community, into life with one another, celebrating our joys and coping with our struggles together. Jesus calls us into relationship, to learning and growing together, to working together, walking side by side through this journey of life, doing our best to leave the world better than we received it, together. We can't any of us do this work alone, but together we can do anything we put our hearts and minds to.

So while we celebrate independence with a parade, a cookout, and a bunch of explosions on July 4th, let's spend the other 364 days of the year working on our inter-dependence, deepening the ties that make us community, strengthening our relationships, building new connections, and honoring the threads of creation that tie us all together.

News From The Church Garden

We had a wonderful work day on June 12th. The terribly hot weather broke and we had a beautiful morning for digging and planting. There was a bit of struggle in digging for some of the



plants, including finding a brick buried in the ground at the exact spot we wanted to plant, but we persevered. We planted:

four pinky winky hydrangeas in memory of Michelle Arnold;

two bunches of sun drop flowers (a kind of evening primrose) donated by Connie Wheeler; oodles of daffodils and shorter purple iris donated by Maggie Marcks.

We scrubbed the memorial stones and reapplied several of the plaques that had come off over the years. Two of the original plaques have become damaged and will be replaced, and a new one acquired for Michelle. We also clear coated the memorial stones so they stay a bit cleaner in the coming years. We added a butterfly windchime on a hook behind the cross to add some music to our garden. Next to go in, by the end of June, are some tall orange lilies (from Connie Wheeler). Then we will probably return the rocks that are currently under the tarps, and clean up the sitting area. Joe & Sue Biese have two benches at their house and the memorial stones will also go into place. Then we will let the plants settle and grow and see how they do (the deer are quite fond of our hostas!). There might be more planting next year, depending on how things do over the winter, and there will always be some weeding and sprucing up that needs to be done. After that, we'll work on the L-shaped garden by the west parking, and then who knows where all this dirt digging will lead us

A calcium score can be a useful measure of heart attack risk

Dear Dr. Roach: You mentioned checking a calcium score to help determine risk of having a heart attack. Please explain what that is. Thank you.

— J.S.

Answer: A coronary artery calcium score is a special kind of CT scan that looks for the presence of calcium in the arteries providing blood to heart muscle. Blockages in the arteries are usually calcified, and the scan can calculate the total amount of calcium found in the walls of the blood vessels. The higher the calcium score, the more likely a per-

son is to have blockages in the arteries. However, the test isn't perfect. A person can have calcium without having any blockages, and a person may also have a cholesterol buildup that blocks flow without having calcium. It remains a useful test in certain situations.

I most often use the calcium score when I am not sure whether my patient would benefit from medication therapy to reduce their risk of a heart attack. This comes after a person has made the best changes they can to their lifestyle, especially through diet and exercise, and when they do not otherwise choose to take medication. If the calcium score is zero, then treatment (such as a statin drug) may be safely deferred for five years. The risk of a

heart attack in that time is very low.

Exceptions would be if a person is at high risk, such as from diabetes, strong family history or smoking. In people whose heart disease risk puts them on the border of a recommendation for medication treatment, a calcium score above zero would tip the scales.

Calcium scores are not useful in people who are at very low risk, since they are unlikely to change the course of treatment. Patients who did not want to take a statin drug may change their mind once they receive the result of a high calcium score, but if medication treatment is recommended anyway, a calcium score is not necessary.

Mandatory 10 Digit Dialing

Due to changes implemented by the Federal Communications Commission, ten digit dialing (area code + phone number) becomes mandatory on October 24th, but they are encouraging you to start getting used to the change now. It's also important to check that anything you have that auto dials like medical monitors, alarm systems, and internet connections are converted to ten digit dialing. Long distance calls from land line phones continue to be 1 + area code + phone number and emergency services continue as before.
