## From Pastor Moíra's Desk... Gratítude

I'm starting to wonder if there's a time machine in my house somewhere because the days just seem to be flying past. Somehow it's already November of 2021. That means Advent, the season of preparing for the miracle of Jesus' birth, starts at the end of the month. Then we'll have the Christmas program, and Christmas Eve, and then the year will turn, and then it will be Valentine's Day, and then Lent will start on March 2nd, and then Easter will be here on April 17th and then....

You get the idea. It all just seems to rush together, one day rolling right into the next, sometimes all the days smushing together into one big Hallo-Thanks-Christm-Valent-Easter -Mess.

But hidden in the holiday rush between Halloween and Deer Hunting Season is something that might just provide us with the antidote we need to the relentless holiday hoopla. That would be Thanksgiving.

The cultural history of Thanksgiving is complicated, nothing as simple as the stories we learned in grade school about Pilgrims and Indians. There's a lot of work we need to do, individually and as a country, to understand what really happened when Europeans came to these lands, to address the ways native people were forced from their lands and traditions under the cover of religion and civilization. And the holiday has gotten caught up in eating more than is really good for us, and for many getting ready to spend too much money at Black Friday sales. There's also, of course, for many football to be watched and deer to be hunted, and maybe in all that the gratitude and actual thanks-giving part of the holiday be in danger of being lost.

Giving thanks, being grateful for the blessings in our lives, isn't something that, as disciples of Jesus, we are supposed to leave to one Thursday in November. It's supposed to be how we live our lives each and every day.

Some days the gratitude just pours out of us—when we're with our friends and family, when we welcome a new life into the world, when we celebrate love, when someone we love has a new accomplishment or achievement, when there's word of healing and health after a struggle. And, some days, of course, the gratitude is a little hard to find. It's still there, but it's under the grief, the struggle, the pain, the worry, the fear, and all those other things that happen in our lives. But even on those days we can be grateful for a friend who was there when we thought we were entirely alone; a beautiful sunrise reminding us of a new day ahead; a hot cup of tea and a bed to lie down in to allow our bodies to rest; a

cardinal at the feeder reminding us of someone we love who has walked on. And if nothing else, on the hardest of days, we can be grateful that they're over, that we don't have to live through that particular day again.

Yes, 2021 has been a wild ride full of all kinds of challenges personally, for our families, for our parish, for our communities, and for the world, and I know many people who are tempted to try and just draw a line under it, write off the year, leave it on the waste heap of the past (like some tried to do with the challenges of 2020). But I believe the year can still be redeemed, that there's good yet to find in these closing days of the year.

If you're reading this on November 1st, that means there are sixty-one days left in the calendar year. What if we all tried, as best we can, to find one thing to be grateful for in these days? If every member of our parish did that—one gratitude a day for the rest of the year—then on New Year's Eve we would have collected more than 18,000 gratitudes, more than enough to overwhelm the challenges that the past months have presented us with.

They can be big gratitudes like a new baby, a new job, healing and health returning; or they can be the small gratitudes of daily living. They don't have to be big. As I said in worship recently, not spilling my breakfast sandwich down my shirt on the way to church on Sunday is something I'm often grateful for. It can be getting the dishes washed, or remembering to bring back in the garbage bins after they've been emptied, or managing to wear matching shoes every day during the week.

But imagine it, 18,000 things we are thankful and grateful for. I we represented them with leaves on a tree, or pumpkins in a patch, or feathers on a turkey they would all be full beyond our imagining. And that's because when we stop to look, and we train our hearts and minds to see, then the gratitude is all around us, the things we have to be thankful for just keep coming, and coming. It turns out, when you start to look, you become better at seeing the gratitude. You learn to find it, even in the midst of the hard days, even on the days that seem like they're nothing but struggle.

My prayer for these closing days is that we might all cultivate, grow that attitude of gratitude in our hearts, and our minds, and our spirits that in all things, whatever the circumstances of our lives, we might give thanks for the many blessings of our lives, that we might live in gratitude and thanksgiving with our every breath, and that we might share that spirit with all the world through our words and our actions.

## **Covid-19 Procedures for Worship & Gatherings**

## Mandatory 10 Digit Dialing

Due to changes implemented by the Federal Communications Commission, ten digit dialing (area code + phone

It's also important to check that anything you have that auto dials like medical monitors, alarm systems, and internet connections are converted to ten digit dialing.
