From Pastor Moira's Desk...

It feels like January has been about a hundred years long. It's often like that with the cold of winter and the let down after the holidays, but this year it seems even longer, like we're packing more and more into every day and a lot of folks (myself included) are wondering just how much we can absorb before it's time to pull the blankets up over our heads and stay in bed forever. 2025 got off to a rocky start with the horrible violence in New Orleans and there has been SO MUCH since then, both in our lives and in the life of the world.

<u>You're not alone</u>. If you're weary, angry, tired, confused, frustrated, grumpy, impatient, and thinking of throwing your television out the window, you're in good company. Just about everyone I know is feeling the strain of these days, and at least for me there is some comfort in the solidarity that the struggle isn't mine alone. In the ups, and downs, and in-betweens of life we are IN THIS TOGETHER. None of us can do this life on our own, and we shouldn't even try. We need each other. We were created to be dependent on God and on one another through all that life brings, the present moment included.

Think about what you can do to *take care of yourself* during the intensity of this season in our lives. As I've said often, please know it's ok if you turn off the news. You are not responsible for monitoring every situation every minute of the day. Think about easing into your day with cartoons or re-runs of something like "The Wild Wild West" instead of the morning commentary. Watch the news for the weather after dinner, but then switch over to reading a book, or calling a friend, or watching an old favorite movie. A constant diet of the news will eat away at your heart and your ability to see any goodness or hope in the world.

<u>Remember what our faith calls us to do</u>, in these days, and in all our days. The work of Jesus' disciples doesn't depend on who holds which office. While it might be easier or harder depending on administrations and their policies (at all levels of government), the work of caring for the vulnerable, creating community, and sharing love doesn't change. The greatest commandment lays out our life's work ~ love God, love our neighbor, and love ourselves. The story of the Good Samaritan makes it clear that everyone, absolutely everyone, is our neighbor for whom we are called to care as if they were our most beloved friends and family. Our job is to reach out to those in need ~ the hungry, the thirsty, the sick, the imprisoned, the lonely, the grieving, the foreigner, the stranger, the weary, the broken-hearted, the outcast ~ and to share with them the good news of God's love in word and deed, with the tangible resources of this life like food and shelter and clothing, and with the less tangible things like nurture, community, support, and a place to belong, where they can truly be all of who God created them to be without judgement or fear.

And we have to be about the work of *finding and being the good in the world*. We are people whose faith and lives are rooted in an utterly improbable story: a baby born in a barn to the least likely of people so God could come into the world; that baby who grew into a man who called not the rich and powerful but the humble and the hurting; and a man who spoke of love, grace, mercy, and hope even with his dying breath; a man who died, but whom death could not hold because life and love had the final word with a stone rolled away and an empty tomb. That is who we are, and at moments like this we need to dig deep into that story, the story of our faith, and help it give us the courage to live in this world, looking for good, for stories of hope and courage and sharing and compassion, and being those things for this world.

There are hundreds of thousands of ways we can all reach out and be the love and hope in the world today, that we can be the miracle someone might just be waiting for. We offer kindness, we celebrate goodness, we share our resources, we offer a listening ear, we interrupt the cycles of violence and bigotry, we take care of folks near and far, we laugh and cry together, we challenge oppression, we hold the door open for someone, we bake cookies, we pray with and for each other, we You get the idea ~ we live our lives, deeply rooted in the faith and love that Jesus showed us, trying our best to follow in his footsteps. We leave the judgement to God, and we open ourselves to love, and love, and more love. And we confess and share together our successes and our failures, and we try again, over and over again until the fullness of God's kingdom comes, not for some, but truly for ALL people everywhere, and for all creation.

<u>PLEASE</u> be in touch and let's talk in these days. Don't try to do any of this on your own. Know that this is why I'm here, to help us all as we navigate life in this world as people of deep faith, trusting in the goodness of God's incredible mercy and amazing grace. I'll put the kettle on, or meet you at the coffee shop or the supper club, and we can think it all through. I'll get out my pom-poms (you know I have a bucket full of them!) and cheer for you, and for all of us together. I'll lace up my sneakers and walk with you as we work TOGETHER in this life.

I pray that we might all live into these words from the hymn, "Praise To The Living God" (#8 in our hymnal), that our lives, in thought and word and deed, might be a testimony to Jesus, the Way, the source and hope of all our lives.

In these tumultuous days, so full of hope and strife, may we bear witness to the Way, O Source and Goal of life.

News from the Congregational Annual Meeting

We had a wonderful group (52 members + friends) gather after worship on Sunday January 26th to do the business of our life together. Reports were reviewed and the budget for 2025 was approved. Even though she didn't have her pom-poms with her, Pastor Moira reminded us that we are AMAZING and our three churches do an incredible job working together.

We re-elected Trevor Rohloff to serve another 3 year term on the Council and learned that the Council will continue to work on filling the second position, thanking Lizzie Tesch for agreeing to continue to serve until that work is complete. The Council will organize itself at its February 11th meeting.

We elected Barry Zuleger to another term on the Endowment Committee.

We talked about the changes coming to the Wisconsin Conference including the proposal that the associations be disbanded and the work of the associations integrated across the conference. This included conversation about a zoom meeting to learn about these changes on March 13th and delegates to the Conference annual meeting June 6-9 (if you're interested in attending, please talk with Pastor Moira ~ registration, lodging & meals paid for!)

We talked about ongoing projects in the church including the bell tower plastering, looking for a musician, and the work to get the bell tower clock working properly again (a HUGE thanks to Mark Hooyman for taking the lead on that work).

We learned about the Wisconsin Conference's Leadership Forward campaign which the Council is recommending a goal of \$3,000 for us to contribute over 3 years to help with continuing education of clergy & laity in the conference, congregational grants, and the ministerial assistance fund (look for more information in coming newsletters).

We talked about the Good Shepherd Services Pastoral Care Committee, a change from the old annual meetings we used to send delegates to. If anyone is interested in attending these meetings (6 per year on a Wednesday morning), please be in touch with Pastor.

There was conversation about the furnishings in the sanctuary, and gathering the stories of the things in our church (the dreamcatcher outside the gathering room, the story of our stained glass windows, and such).


